Uniform

The children must wear

- a maroon sweatshirt, hoodie or cardigan (with or without the school logo)
- grey trousers, shorts or skirt with a sky-blue polo shirt
- or a red or blue gingham dress with black shoes or plain black trainers. On their PE days they must wear:
- a T-shirt in their House Team colour (every child is provided with one of these, free of charge, at the beginning of every school year)
- PLAIN black, blue or grey shorts, joggers or leggings
- a maroon sweatshirt, hoodie or cardigan
- trainers or plimsols.

Children need to bring a reading bag and a water bottle to school every day. Backpacks are not allowed in school unless for a specific purpose agreed with the Headteacher.

Stud earrings must be less than 5mm and cannot be worn for PE—either removed or covered with a plaster (brought from home)

Make-up, painted nails, false nails and temporary tattoos are not allowed in school.

Behaviour

Our school rules are to be safe, to be respectful and to be ready so that everyone feels accepted and valued within a calm and positive environment where we solve problems together. We award House Team Points to reward children for going 'above and beyond' in any aspect of school life. These are counted, announced and celebrated every Friday in our House Team Assembly.

If a child's behaviour falls below our expectations they will work through a series of stepped boundaries:

- 1. Redirection
- 2. Reminder
- 3. Yellow Card
- 4. Red Card
- 5. Follow Up

We will always contact parents and carers if a child's behaviour is causing concern and ALWAYS if it extreme such as physical aggression, verbal abuse or bullying.

Reading


We expect children to read daily at home, and we will monitor their reading and offer support if they are struggling.

The children can also access our school library for a book of their choice, and also choose a library book from Cockerton Library as

part of our regular school visits.

Pupils in Year 4 will have a daily whole class reading session. In these lessons children will develop their fluency and comprehension skills

Children will also visit the library several times a term, where they can choose a book of their choice.

Writing

This term we will continue to focus on grammar and punctuation, using a new resource called Grammarsaurus.

We will be looking at how sentences are structured, different components of a sentence and understanding how we can use this to improve our writing

Linking to the class text and South America, the children will study the features of various forms of text and complete their own writing in these different genres to entertain, report, persuade, explain and to inform:

Religious Education (RE)



The first half term's Big Question is 'What kind of world did Jesus want?'. In this unit, we will explore the example of Jesus as told through the Gospel stories, and use parables to consider the lessons we can learn today.

After the half term holiday, we will look at the Big Question 'Why do Christians call the day Jesus died Good Friday?' We will be thinking about the meaning of Salvation from a Christian perspective, and what the events of Good Friday mean for Christians today.

Our unit this term is 'Where does our food come from?

Pupils will be looking at the distribution of the world's biomes and mapping food imports from around the world; learning about trading fairly, focusing on Côte d'Ivoire and



cocoa beans; exploring where the food for the children's school dinners comes from and the argument of 'local versus global'.

Computing



In Computing this term, we will look at developing skills in audio production and data logging. We will create sound files, which can then be edited and improved. We will work in groups to create our sound productions, using voices and instruments.

After half term, we will look at using computing skills to log data on light and noise, and understand how data is information which can be used to make predictions and plans.



Art and Design



In Art we will be using mixed media to look at how we can create light and dark shades in our artwork. We will explore the difference between tints and shades, to create a still life picture.

Design Technology

After half term, we will learn about kinetic energy, and how this can be applied to motion, as we design and make our own slingshot cars



Music

In the first half of this term, we will be using a song called 'Stop!' a rap/song about bullying. This is a 'grime' style rap

song, with fantastic rhythms and a positive message. We will learn about the interrelated dimensions of music through games, singing and composing.



Then after half term, we will use the soul/gospel song 'Lean on Me' by Bill Withers, comparing styles and rhythms as we improve our performance

French

Les Legumes We will learn 10 common vegetables in their plural form with their definite articles. We will learn

the basic transactional language required take part in a role-play activity based on buying different quantities of vegetables from a market stall.

Je me Presente After half term, we will focus on asking questions as well as providing accurate replies. They will demonstrate a growing understanding of grammar to manipulate language and start to create sentences of their own using a range of personal details including name, age, where they live and nationality.



RSHE



This term we will focus on keeping ourselves safe online, including looking at appropriate relationships, privacy, digital footprints and online bullying.

We will grow to understand the importance of digital wellbeing, and begin to understand that not everything online is to be trusted!
